### Why did you want to join the police?

Before joining the force, I worked in an office at Chapelcross and quickly realised that I wanted a job with more contact with people. I also wanted a challenging job that I felt was worthwhile doing and started looking at the police force as an option that would offer a range of opportunities.

### What does your current job involve?

Like most jobs in the service, this role has a lot of variety.
